Save the Date: April 1-4, 2024 Girl Scout History Institute at Edith Macy Conference Center

The Girl Scout History Institute will offer opportunities for Girl Scout council historians and archivists to learn, grow, and play! Workshop topics for the event include exhibition design, accessibility, collections storage solutions, and more! Join your fellow Girl Scout historians for shared meals in the Macy dining room, evening social events, and to raise a glass of champagne with GSUSA CEO Bonnie Barczykowski as we celebrate the newly renovated Archive Research Center (the ARC).

The 2024 Girl Scout History Institute has limited capacity. In the interest of having as many councils represented as possible at this event, registration will be limited to one representative per council. Monday, April 1, will be a travel day, concluding with dinner and evening activities together. Programming begins on Tuesday, April 2, through the morning of Thursday, April 4.

Registration is open through Eventbrite. A registration link will be sent to Council CEOs and only councils will be able to register their representative.

Cost: \$327 per person, per night for single occupancy and \$222 per person, per night for double occupancy. These costs include room and board. There will be no additional costs for the program workshops.

Macy Scholarship: The Macy Scholarship will cover 50% of the Macy costs (room, board, and programming) for the first 80 registrants for this event. Travel costs will be the responsibility of all participants/councils. All participants must register through their council, and the scholarship will be dispersed by reimbursement to each council.
